I am continuing my research, working towards writing my dissertation for the MSc(Res) under the Earth and Environmental Sciences department. I work closely with the archaeological team at McMaster University on the Stelida Naxos Archaeological Project (SNAP) to further the study of the peak sanctuary at Stelida, Naxos, specifically in the reconstruction of its socio-religious 'catchment area'. My field season in Naxos, Greece will be this February and March, where I will travel to Naxos for 3 weeks to collect data that I will then take back to St Andrews to analyze for my dissertation. I will spend my time there collaborating closely with members of our research team, uncovering ways to involve petrological and geochemical methodologies to the lithic artifacts at the Greek archaeological site. To get involved outside of my personal research, I have joined the Geological Society and the Paleontological Society, joining in on social events and pub quizzes with various undergraduates and postgraduates. I have also participated in a program that connects university students with the local children's nursery, where I have read and played with the kids for many hours.

Over the semester, I have traveled to five separate countries including Denmark, Sweden, Spain, Holland, and France. All my adventures have included my Bobby Jones peers, Amelia and Shreyas, whom I have grown very fond of this semester. I have found joy in discovering the ease of inter-European travel and plan to visit many more countries in my second semester, especially with friends from my accommodation and fellow Bobby Jones Scholars. At the end of the semester, I went to Edinburgh for two days, experiencing the rich history and fun Christmas markets that the city had to offer. After the semester wrapped up, I have spent my Winter Break with my parents, two brothers, grandmother, and dog in Seattle, WA for some much-needed family time.



TRIBUTE TO PRESIDENT CARTER

On December 29, 2024, President Jimmy Carter passed away at his home in Plains, Georgia. A devoted public servant with an international legacy, President Carter nevertheless maintained deep roots in his home state. He was University Distinguished Professor at Emory for more than 40 years and, in 1982, established The Carter Center with Rosalynn Carter to advance international human rights. <u>National</u> and <u>local</u> memorials have enumerated the impact of his presidency and tireless post-presidential work.

President Carter also had a long relationship with the Bobby Jones Scholarship. For more than 30 years, President Carter met every spring with the St Andrews to Emory Bobby Jones Scholars and Fellows. This tradition began shortly after he was appointed University Distinguished Professor and continued until President and Mrs. Carter took a step back from their commitments in spring 2018. I was lucky enough to attend those meetings for 15 years.

No matter the invariable weight of his other commitments, President Carter always came prepared. Without referencing any notes, he knew each Scholar by name and had tailored questions for each of them. He asked about the Scholars' academic and personal interests, and their experiences living in the United States and attending Emory. He told stories about his own life and responded to Scholars' questions. At various times, he talked about his family, his love of fishing, his writing, growing up in Plains, traveling the world, his faith, and his relationship with Rosalynn. He also appreciated and commented on the many Scholars who served as interns at The Carter Center, supporting his work. He even occasionally talked about current politics.

I remember those meetings fondly – filled with humor and meaningful conversations. The exchanges were not the same from year to year, and I don't remember him telling the same story more than once (though I did get to hear about guinea worms frequently!). I admired how those meetings showcased his interest in and love for every individual he met. Like Bobby Jones and the many Jones Scholars who have received the scholarship over its rich history, President Carter was a community leader dedicated to international collaboration. I am thankful for the enduring impact of his presence and honored to count him as a member of the Bobby Jones Community.
